



The Meadows School Project™, recognized as an example of Best Promising Practice by the BC Ministry of Health in 2008, has completed its seventh year in British Columbia, Canada. The full immersion project is an unique and dramatic example of the educational and social richness intergenerational learning engenders. A class of intermediate aged students from School District #22 move into a makeshift classroom at the Coldstream Meadows Retirement Community, where they immerse in two full months of blended activities with the elder residents, study Ministry mandated curriculum, and volunteer their services. Learning takes on a dimension that is characterized by connectedness, authenticity, and meaning. Although this project was initiated by educator Sharon MacKenzie as an attempt to break down stereotyping between generations, its methodology of purposeful socialization brings youth and elder together in profound and empathetic relationships. Elders are stimulated to become actively involved walking and talking with the children, an appreciation of the work ethic is built as students volunteer at the centre, positive experiences of the care-giving professions are introduced to youth, empathy pours forth as life stories are shared, and there is an emergence of good humour that permeates each day of togetherness. Both youth and elders are drawn out of isolation through the consistency and proximity of one another, a sanctum of timely reflection in a busy world where often these two groups are marginalized. The seniors' residence is a magical jewel box. Each day when the lid is opened, faded treasures are polished and tenderly held by young hands discovering qualities of human relationships, dusted with the magic of time passing.

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

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

THE MESSAGE OF THE MEADOWS SCHOOL PROJECT™ INTERGENERATIONAL INITIATIVE

The phrase 'intergenerational initiative' refers to the crossing over of relationships between adults and children, elders and teens, youth and aged. It is characterized by one generation having purposeful and intentional interaction with another. The ultimate health of our society is dependent on the sustainability of these generative inter-lockings of past with present with future.

As a result of the acknowledgement and support of the BC Ministries of Health and Education, Coldstream Meadows Retirement Community, donors, and philanthropist Mogens Smed, (DIRTT Environmental Solutions, and Spider Agile Technologies), the Meadows School Project (TM) Intergenerational Initiative model is full of hope moving into 2009. Its mandate is to stir interest and build commitment towards bringing children, youth, and elders together in relationships that fundamentally affect attitudes, and build sustainable understandings and empathy within our society.

As a result of the success of our model, these steps are in process in 2009 to promote further Intergenerational Learning:

- -Formation of the i2i Intergenerational Society (www.intergenerational.ca)
 - This not-for-profit society, 'Invitation to Intergenerational Immersion, helping elders and youth see Eye to Eye', strives to promote and support sustainable intergenerational activities between schools, communities, and health care facilities.
- -Writing and publishing of a toolkit documenting for health care workers, community, and educators all working levels of intergenerational connecting (available 2009 on i2i website location)
- -Launching of the "Meadows School Intergenerational Literacy Project"
 - Elders, children, and youth across Canada are combining their writing and illustrating talents in small storybooks. The first 10 book box set (available for sale through i2i site) will be completed February 2009, joining a senior author and children illustrators in creation of each book. The goal is to connect generations (one as illustrator, one as author) through a nationwide series available to all school and public libraries. These little books will not only exemplify intergenerational connections of Canadians, but will reflect our vast linguistic and cultural base as well, with author/illustrator networking across the nation.
- -Facilitating intergenerational workshops and presentations for educators, community, health care, or college and university classes with Sharon MacKenzie, educator, founder of Meadows School Project, and Executive Director izi Intergenerational Society () and her team
- -Commencing intergenerational immersion projects in five provinces, with introductory work in three others, UK, and USA
- -Writing and making available intergenerational lessons based on government mandated curriculum expectations
- -Creating awareness about the richness and power of intergenerational initiatives
- -Formally connecting other interested societies, groups, and individuals in a concerted effort to create more intergenerational relationships

In 2009, may we build on our successes of 2008, and may our 2010 Calendar reflect the ongoing nature of these dreams and initiatives.

In 2009, may each of you discover wonderful and fulfilling connections between the past, present, and future.
